1 **RESOLUTION 1-01A**

2
3 **To Encourage the English District of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to Affirm Unequivocally the**
4 **Practice of First Communion Prior to Confirmation as a God-pleasing Practice so as to Encourage**
5 **Member Congregations and Pastors of the English District to Recognize the Validity of the**
6 **Aforementioned Practice and, On That Basis, Commune Visiting Children Who, Though Not Yet**
7 **Confirmed, Are Nevertheless Communicant Members in Good Standing and Who, Therefore, Should**
8 **Not Be Denied the Lord’s Body and Blood Because They Have Not Yet Been Confirmed.**
9

10 WHEREAS, Many member congregations of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod receive children as
11 communicants to the Lord's Supper through the Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation (LSB:
12 Agenda 25-27), and, therefore, have non-Confirmed, yet communicant children who regularly and
13 faithfully commune at their home congregations; and
14

15 WHEREAS, The majority of our Member Congregations do not receive children as full communicant
16 members until they have completed Confirmation and have gone through the Rite of Confirmation (LSB:
17 Agenda, 28-31); and
18

19 WHEREAS, Both the Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation as well as the Rite of Confirmation
20 are countenanced and legitimated by Synod as evidenced by the presence of each rite in and use out of
21 the *Lutheran Service Book: Agenda*; and
22

23 WHEREAS, Both rites exist, not by divine command, but as human ordinances and thus neither have the
24 status of a Sacrament (Ap. XIII.6); and
25

26 WHEREAS, Neither rite confers the status of worthy communicant, which is determined, not by a human
27 ordinance, "but that person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: AGiven and
28 shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," (SC VI; cf., 1Cor.11:27-29); and
29

30 WHEREAS, Both rites fulfill the prescription of the Lutheran Confessions that "people are admitted only
31 if they first had an opportunity to be examined and heard" (AC XXIV.6-7) and "the sacrament is made
32 available to those who wish to partake of it, after they have been examined and absolved" (Ap XXIV.1);
33 (see General Notes for both rites, p. 25 and 28 respectively); and
34

35 WHEREAS, The Lutheran Confessions do not require uniform rites, ordinances, and ceremonies for the
36 sake of the unity of faith and the Church (AC VII.3; cf., Ap XV.18), thus allowing disparate rites to admit
37 children to the Lord's Supper; and
38

39 WHEREAS, The Rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation continues as the minority practice in the
40 Synod, there have been anecdotal cases of children being refused Communion at sister congregations,
41 not on the basis of their unworthiness, determined by whether or not they believe the promise of Jesus
42 "given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," but on the basis, either of their non-Confirmed
43 status or, otherwise, an arbitrary age restriction; and
44

45 WHEREAS, Refusal to Commune such visiting children who have been legitimately received to the Lord's
46 Table through instruction, examination, and absolution, which precedes the Rite of First Communion
47 Prior to Confirmation, causes such little ones, whose angels always behold the face of their Father in
48 heaven, to stumble through confusion and offense (Matt. 18:6: ; see Ap XV.49 regarding how "traditions

49 are truly traps of consciences"); therefore be it

50

51 *Resolved*, That the English District in convention unequivocally affirm the practice of First Communion
52 Prior to Confirmation as a God-pleasing practice and a legitimate way to faithful reception of the Lord's
53 Supper; and be it further

54

55 *Resolved*, That the English District in convention encourage Member Congregations and Pastors of the
56 English District to recognize the validity of the aforementioned practice of First Communion Prior to
57 Confirmation so as to commune visiting children who, though not yet confirmed, are nevertheless
58 communicant members in good standing at their home congregations; and be it further

59

60 *Resolved*, That the English District in convention reject and condemn the error of refusing the body and
61 blood of Jesus Christ to visiting communicant children on the basis of their non-Confirmed status or an
62 arbitrary age restriction; and be it further

63

64 *Resolved*, That the English District in convention encourage the Synod in Convention to adopt the same
65 position; and be it further

66

67 *Resolved*, That the English District survey her Member Congregations in order to determine the
68 percentage of congregations making use of the rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation, and
69 publish the results of said survey among our congregations; and be it further

70

71 *Resolved*, That the English District in convention encourage the Synod in Convention to survey all
72 Member Congregations in order to determine the percentage of congregations making use of the rite of
73 First Communion prior to confirmation, and publish the results of said survey among the congregations
74 of Synod; and be it finally

75

76 *Resolved*, That the English District prepare a tool kit for congregations and Pastors that both equips
77 Pastors who desire to implement such a rite to teach about the practice of First Communion Prior to
78 Confirmation and that, likewise, equips Pastors to instruct congregations who do not yet understand the
79 God-pleasing nature of the rite of First Communion Prior to Confirmation so that such congregations
80 who do not observe this practice gladly welcome and receive visiting communicant children who desire
81 to receive the Lord's Supper, and that encourages all communicant members to announce for
82 Communion when visiting congregations other than their own.

1 **RESOLUTION 1-02A**

2
3 **To State Religious Objection to Government Interference of Parents' Duty**

4
5 WHEREAS, The Small Catechism confesses that God has created and given to each person "my body";
6 and

7
8 WHEREAS, The body of the baptized is the temple of the Holy Spirit and belongs not to government or
9 its institutions (such as schools: public or private), but to God (1 Corinthians 6:19); and

10
11 WHEREAS, The Fourth Commandment, as explained in the Large Catechism, places all authority over a
12 child on the parents of that child, so that we confess, "All authority flows and is born from the authority
13 of parents. Where a father is unable alone to educate his child, he uses a schoolmaster to teach the
14 child. So all whom we call "masters" are in the place of parents and must get their power and authority
15 to govern from them" (para 141-142; emphasis added); and

16
17 WHEREAS, The Scriptures (and the Catechism) do not limit parental authority to a particular age, but
18 state that God has given authority to parents over all children who live in their household; and

19
20 WHEREAS, Government in our society at federal, state, and local levels has attempted or may attempt to
21 step between children and their parents (impeding the parents' duty to raise their children in the faith
22 and life of the Christian confession) in various ways, including but not limited to

- 23 • Laws that mandate vaccines for children even without parents' approval
- 24 • Laws that allow, recommend, or give children sex-change operations or medical procedures
25 for "transitioning" minors without parents' approval
- 26 • Laws that permit minors to get an abortion without parents' approval
- 27 • Laws that label parents who refuse their minor children vaccines, sex-change operations and
28 procedures, or abortions as engaging in child abuse
- 29 • Laws that remove children from the custody of parents who refuse their minor children
30 vaccines, sex-change operations and procedures, or abortions
- 31 • School policies that teach children various anti-scriptural social agendas without parents'
32 approval
- 33 • School policies that mandate vaccines for children even without parents' approval
- 34 • School policies that encourage children to "transition" or use gender-confusing language or
35 introduce sexual or gender identities that do not conform with the child's birth sex without
36 parents' approval

37 Therefore, be it

38
39 *Resolved*, That the English District boldly, unequivocally, and plainly state its objection on the grounds
40 of religious belief to any federal, state, or local law or mandate, or any school policy, that imposes the
41 government's will over the parents' duty to raise their children or that aids the minor child's will to be
42 kept secret from the parents; and further be it

43
44 *Resolved*, That the English District state plainly its willingness and readiness to support, come to the aid
45 of, and speak in defense of any parents within sister congregations of the English District who face the
46 challenge of government laws or school policies interfering with parents' duties to raise their children
47 in the fear of the Lord; and be it further

48 *Resolved*, That the English District urge The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in convention and each
49 and every one of her districts to boldly, unequivocally, and plainly state their unconditional agreement
50 with this religious objection to government interference in the Christian parent’s duty to raise their
51 children in the faith and life of the Christian confession; and be it further
52

53 *Resolved*, That the English District urge The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and each and every one
54 of her districts to boldly, unequivocally, and plainly denounce any teachings of any church bodies which
55 seek to advocate for or tolerate the government interfering with parents’ duties in raising their children
56 in the Christian faith and life. Such teachings are unbiblical, unchristian, heretical, opposed to God, and
57 worthy of condemnation; and be it finally
58

59 *Resolved*, That the English District urge her congregations and all their families to benefit their children
60 with the use of Lutheran schools or Lutheran homeschools/hybrid co-ops, or to become involved in
61 their local public school government, that the parents may safeguard their God-given responsibility,
62 and that the children may be protected from such government overreach and godless agendas and
63 may be raised in the proper fear of the Lord.

1 **RESOLUTION 1-03A**

2
3 **To Reject Kinism**

4
5 WHEREAS, We are all descended from Adam and Eve, who were created in God’s image, and therefore
6 are members of one human race, each formed by Him and with a special status in His created order
7 (Genesis 1:26-28, 3:20, 9:6; Psalm 8:4-8, 139:13-16; Acts 17:25-26; Ephesians 3:15); and

8
9 WHEREAS, We are all equally sinners for whom Christ died and rose again, that all who believe in Him
10 should not perish but have eternal life (Psalm 51:10; John 3:16-17; Romans 4:25; Ephesians 2:5); and

11
12 WHEREAS, By His will, God’s Church on earth includes members from a great diversity of backgrounds (1
13 Corinthians 12:13; Galatians 3:28; Ephesians 2:11-14); and

14
15 WHEREAS, God shows no partiality among His people (Deuteronomy 10:17; Job 34:19; Acts 10:34;
16 Romans 2:10-11; Galatians 2:6; Ephesians 6:9; Colossians 3:25; 1 Peter 1:17); and

17
18 WHEREAS, We are called to deeply love and serve one another as God has first loved us (Leviticus 19:18;
19 Matthew 19:19, 22:39; Mark 12:31; Luke 10:27; Romans 13:9; Galatians 5:14, 6:10; 1 Corinthians 9:22; 2
20 Corinthians 6:3; James 2:8; 1 Peter 2:17; 1 John 4:10,19); and

21
22 WHEREAS, We joyfully anticipate the Last Day, when we will be numbered among a great multitude
23 from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages eternally in God’s presence, and singing His
24 praise (Revelation 7:9-10; cf. Revelation 5:8-9); and

25
26 WHEREAS, Hatred of the brother is a grievous sin akin to murder, violating the sanctity of human life,
27 and with grave impact on one’s eternal salvation (Exodus 20:13 [Deuteronomy 5:17]; Matthew 5:21-22;
28 Galatians 5:21; 1 John 3:14-15; Revelation 21:8; SC The Fifth Commandment); and

29
30 WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) Committee on Theology and Church Relations
31 released the report *Racism and the Church: Overcoming the Idolatry* in February, 1994 which
32 condemned the hatred of our brothers, stating, “It is time to let our light shine and, through the
33 proclamation of the glorious Gospel of our blessed God, to lead the way to the inclusion of all our sisters
34 and brothers in Christ in the full exercise of the rights and privileges that belong to them as priests.
35 What a beautiful opportunity we have to let God’s will be done on earth as it most certainly is done in
36 heaven, where there is not now, nor will there ever be, any partiality shown to anyone. We must all
37 continually seek God’s help in helping each other in our Synod to resist the temptations toward racist
38 thinking and to eradicate its poisonous effects in our lives, that we may walk together in true unity of
39 mind, heart, and purpose, even as we are one in Christ.”; and

40
41 WHEREAS, The Synod in convention has over time adopted numerous resolutions condemning hatred
42 based on race in all of its manifestations across the political and ideological spectrum, including 2019
43 Resolution 11-04A, To Affirm the Common Humanity of All People and Ethnicities; and 2023 Resolution
44 11-02A, To Reject All Forms of Racism and Affirm Our Witness to All People; and

45
46 WHEREAS, Kinism promotes the belief that God has ordained separation of races in all areas of life,
47 twists Scripture to divide the Church by race, and promote racial superiority and segregation (“Has God
48 indeed said...?”, cf. Genesis 3:1); and

49 WHEREAS, Kinism has been roundly condemned by the Synodical leadership; and

50

51 WHEREAS, Individuals, some of whom are members of LCMS congregations, have promoted Kinism
52 online, at times attacking Synod as a whole, and at times individual members of Synod, sadly attempting
53 to lure the faithful away from the truth of Scripture (Matthew 24:11; Acts 20:30; 2 Corinthians 11:13; 1
54 Timothy 4:1; 2 Peter 2:1-3; Jude 4); therefore be it

55

56 *Resolved*, That the English District reject and publicly condemn Kinism, affirming that all baptized
57 believers are one in Christ (Romans 12:4-5; 1 Corinthians 10:17, 12:12,20; Ephesians 2:19, 4:4-5,16;
58 Colossians 3:15), and encourage Synod to do the same; and be it further

59

60 *Resolved*, That the English District encourage her Pastors to make their congregations aware of the
61 challenge of Kinism, and refute it through the lens of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions, and
62 encourage Synod to do the same; and be it further

63

64 *Resolved*, That the English District encourage her Pastors in the course of their teaching, to intentionally
65 teach sound hermeneutical principles to the members of their congregations, to equip the laity to respond
66 to this or any temptation of “Has God indeed said...?” (Genesis 3:1) by appealing to Scripture rightly read
67 and understood (Matthew 4:1-11; 1 John 4:1), and encourage the Synod to do the same; and be it further

68

69 *Resolved*, Resolved, that the English District in convention grant her support for the Bishop, insofar as he
70 deems necessary, to publicly support any clergymen, congregation, or active member of the LCMS
71 who/that is targeted, attacked, or threatened by individuals infected by Kinism, and encourage Synod to
72 do the same; and be it finally

73

74 *Resolved*, That English District call on Pastors and laity to mark and avoid those who work to “cause
75 divisions and create obstacles in the Church”, and “deceive hearts” contrary to God’s Truth (Romans
76 16:17-18), praying that they repent, receive His absolution and cleansing, restoration to His Church, and
77 eternal life in Him (Luke 15:1-10; 1 John 1:9), and encourage Synod to do the same.

To Encourage Unity Among Our Churches

5 **Preamble**

6 With geopolitical and socio-economic strife is on the rise between Canada, the United States, and many
7 other nations; and because these tensions are spilling into the hearts of the members of our
8 congregations; and because the English District is part of God's holy Church and a "District without
9 borders", we respectfully ask that the District issue a public statement encouraging repentance, amity,
10 unity and prayer among our congregations.

11
12 WHEREAS, Geopolitical tension and socio-economic strife is creating division and antagonism between
13 peoples and nations; and

14
15 WHEREAS, This political tension is being felt by members of our English District congregations; and

16
17 WHEREAS, The Kingdom of God is not of this world (*John 18:36*), Christ is undivided (*1 Corinthians 1:13*),
18 and so too His Body (*Colossians 3:12-15*); and

19
20 Whereas, Luther's explanation of the eighth commandment in the *Small Catechism* states that we do
21 not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead, we are to
22 come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the kindest way;
23 Therefore, be it

24
25 *Resolved*, That the English District issue a public statement encouraging the Pastors and members of our
26 congregations to repent of any sinful or divisive behaviors, receive the forgiveness and comfort Christ
27 alone can give, pursue peace and unity with one another across international borders, and pray for and
28 bless one another, beseeching the Father, Son and Holy Spirit's power and presence as they pray.

1 **RESOLUTION 3-01A**

3

To Realign and Rename Visitation Circuits

4 **Preamble**

5 Visitation Circuits are created by Districts and exist for the benefit of congregations and the rostered
6 church workers of those congregations.

7

8 LCMS Bylaw 5.1.1 defines the purpose of Visitation Circuits:

9 5.1.1 A visitation circuit is a network of congregations that “walks together” for mutual care, support,
10 advice, study, ecclesiastical encouragement, service, coordination, resources, and counsel—all for
11 the sake of greater congregational participation in God’s mission.

12

13 LCMS Bylaw 5.1.2 governs how Visitation Circuits are established, which is understood to mean that the
14 establishment of Visitation Circuits is done by action of the District Convention, unless District Bylaws
15 provide for another process:

16 5.1.2 Districts shall establish visitation circuits according to geographical criteria.

17

18 **Rationale**

19 Visitation Circuit 9 (Cleveland–Akron) and Visitation Circuit 10 (Cleveland–West) have seen a decline in
20 member congregations and communicant members. For many years, these two Visitation Circuits have
21 met together and continue to meet as essentially one Circuit. For the past several triennia, these two
22 Visitation Circuits have been joined to create one Electoral Circuit for the purpose of electing delegates to
23 the Synod Convention. These two Visitation Circuits desire to be combined into one Visitation Circuit.

24 The merger of Visitation Circuits 9 & 10 would eliminate a Visitation Circuit, requiring a renumbering of
25 the Visitation Circuits of the District. The geographic location of several congregations would allow them
26 to be better served by being moved to different Visitation Circuits. Additionally, several Visitation Circuits
27 have begun to refer to themselves by new names to better reflect their member congregations.

28 Therefore be it

29

30 *Resolved*, That the current Visitation Circuits 9 & 10 be merged into one Visitation Circuit; and be it further

31

32 *Resolved*, That the Visitation Circuits of the English District be realigned and renamed as follows:

6 six (6) ministers of religion [four (4) ordained ministers—President, Secretary, one (1) ordained minister
7 from the Eastern or Lake Erie Region, and one (1) ordained minister from the Midwestern or Western
8 Region—and two (2) commissioned ministers] and six (6) laypersons [one (1) from each District Region
9 and two (2) from the District at-large] who are elected by the District Convention (EN Bylaws 5.2.2, 5.4.4,
10 5.4.5, 5.5.3, and 9.1.1); and

12 WHEREAS, Regional representation by ordained ministers to the District Board of Directors is currently
13 provided by the four Regional Vice-Presidents, who “shall advise the President, serve as his
14 representatives, and assist him in bringing to the Board of Directors any needed recommendations” (EN
15 Bylaw 4.3) and also serve as non-voting members of the Board of Directors (EN Bylaw 9.1.2); and

16
17 WHEREAS, The English District may be better served by electing ordained ministers with various skill sets
18 (legal, finance, investment, administration, etc.) to its Board of Directors without limitation by District
19 Region; and

20
21 WHEREAS, The election of commissioned ministers as voting members of the Board of Directors is no
22 longer limited by District Region (cf. 2018 Resolution 3-03A); and

23
24 WHEREAS, The proposed bylaw amendments would not change the existing practice of the District
25 Convention electing six (6) ministers of religion and six (6) laypersons to serve as voting members of the
26 Board of Directors; and

29 English District Convention has been conducted under the current limitation by District Region (EN Bylaw

6 **Preamble**

7 WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has committed to caring for pastors and
8 church workers in one of its seven mission priorities, to wit: "To promote and nurture the spiritual,
9 emotional, financial, and physical well-being of pastors and professional church workers;" and

10
11 WHEREAS, There are a number of reasons a person might self-terminate a Divine Call, e.g. age of
12 retirement, mental or physical health concerns or incapacitations, personal conviction, etc.; and

13
14 WHEREAS, There is biblical precedent for the non-death ending of a tenure of service, e.g. Numbers
15 8:23-26; and

16
17 WHEREAS, The Commission on Theology and Church Relations (CTCR) discussed termination of Divine
18 Call in its 2003 Report "Theology and Practice of 'The Divine Call'" only from the perspective of outside
19 termination and not self-termination; and

20
21 WHEREAS, Care should be given to the worker and the people of God served by the worker throughout
22 the length of a Divine Call, including if a Call is terminated or self-terminated; and

23
24 WHEREAS, There is a paucity of theological rationale and practical direction in the Synod for the many
25 ways a Divine Call might be self-terminated before death; and

26
27 WHEREAS, There can be confusion in the Church over legitimate and illegitimate reasons for terminating
28 or self-terminating a Divine Call which might result in anxiety over Candidate status; therefore be it

29
30 *Resolved*, That church workers and congregations be given clear teaching on the theological and
31 practical procedures when a Divine Call is terminated or self-terminated; and be it further

32
33 *Resolved*, That the English District memorialize Synod to instruct the CTCR to offer clarity regarding
34 theological and practical considerations for the ways a Divine Call might be legitimately or illegitimately
35 terminated or self-terminated; and be it further

36
37 *Resolved*, That the English District in convention memorialize Synod that the COP is to establish support
38 and training materials for church workers who self-terminate their Divine Call legitimately; and be it
39 further

40
41 *Resolved*, That district presidents and circuit visitors work with the workers and congregations of their
42 district to support their called church workers before, during, and aftertimes of termination and self
43 termination; and be it finally

44
45 *Resolved*, That the English District convention send this resolution as an overture to the 2026 Synod
46 convention.

1 **RESOLUTION 4-02A**

2
3 **To Direct the Office of National Mission to Perform a Systematic Review of All Registered Service**
4 **Organizations (RSOs)**

5
6 WHEREAS, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has historically emphasized accountability and
7 doctrinal integrity in its affiliations, ensuring that those organizations receiving its endorsement or
8 partnership remain faithful to the teachings of Holy Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions (Titus 1:9,
9 “He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in
10 sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it”); and

11
12 WHEREAS, The LCMS recognizes certain organizations as Registered Service Organizations (RSOs),
13 granting them recognition and endorsement, and in some cases financial and institutional support, on
14 the basis that their mission and practices align with biblical and confessional Lutheran teaching, as
15 outlined in LCMS Bylaw 6.2, which establishes the process and requirements for RSO status within the
16 Synod; and

17
18 WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 6.2.1 states that RSOs must “function in harmony with the programs of the
19 boards of the Synod and in furtherance of the mission and ministry of the church”, making it necessary
20 to ensure ongoing compliance with doctrinal standards; and

21
22 WHEREAS, LCMS Bylaw 6.2.6 places oversight of RSOs under the Office of National Mission (ONM),
23 which evaluates and reviews RSOs to determine whether they remain in alignment with LCMS doctrine
24 and practice; and

25
26 WHEREAS, Faithful stewardship requires ongoing review to ensure that these organizations continue to
27 uphold sound doctrine and biblical practices; and

28
29 WHEREAS, There is a growing need for transparency and accountability in the work of all organizations
30 affiliated with the church, ensuring that they adhere to biblical principles in matters of faith, morality,
31 and financial stewardship (Luke 16:10, “One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much”); and

32
33 WHEREAS, The LCMS must take seriously its responsibility to avoid supporting or endorsing organizations
34 that have drifted from the teachings of Holy Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions (Romans 16:17, “I
35 appeal to you, brothers, to watch out for those who cause divisions and create obstacles contrary to the
36 doctrine that you have been taught; avoid them”); therefore, be it

37
38 *Resolved*, That the LCMS Office of National Mission, in coordination with the various mission offices and
39 the council of presidents, conduct a systematic review of all RSOs, ensuring that each organization
40 maintains alignment with biblical teaching and the doctrinal position of the LCMS; and be it further

41
42 *Resolved*, That this review assess each RSO’s doctrinal stance, financial stewardship, and ethical practices
43 in light of Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions; and be it further

44
45 *Resolved*, That the ONM, in coordination with the various mission offices and the council of presidents
46 and in accordance with LCMS Bylaw 6.2.6, take corrective action regarding any RSO found to be
47 doctrinally or ethically out of alignment with LCMS teachings, including but not limited to placing the

48 organization on probationary status, requiring doctrinal correction, or, if necessary, revoking RSO status;
49 and be it further

50

51 *Resolved*, That the LCMS ONM, in coordination with the various mission offices and the council of
52 presidents, shall take immediate action to revoke the RSO status of any organization that is publicly
53 known to be acting in direct opposition to the doctrine of the Synod, including but not limited to those
54 engaged in unlawful activity, those who abet lawbreakers, those who affirm or promote same-sex
55 relationships, or those who facilitate the adoption of children to same-sex couples; and be it further

56

57 *Resolved*, That any RSO whose status has been revoked due to doctrinal or ethical violations may apply
58 for reinstatement, provided that the organization demonstrates repentance, publicly renounces its
59 previous errors, and affirms in writing its adherence to the biblical and confessional teachings of the
60 LCMS; and be it further

61

62 *Resolved*, That organizations found to be out of alignment with LCMS doctrine be given a clear path to
63 correction and reinstatement, provided they demonstrate repentance and a return to biblical and
64 confessional teaching (Galatians 6:1, "Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are
65 spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness"); and be it further

66

67 *Resolved*, That the findings of this review be reported in their entirety to the Synod and made available
68 for the benefit of congregations and members of the LCMS; and be it finally

69

70 *Resolved*, That the LCMS reaffirm its commitment to biblical stewardship, ensuring that all partnerships
71 and affiliations reflect the mission and values of Christ's Church as taught in Holy Scripture and confessed
72 in the Lutheran Confessions.

1 **RESOLUTION 4-03A**

3 **To Affirm the Board of Regents and Administration of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor**
4 **in Their Efforts to Resolve Financial Deficits**

5
6 WHEREAS, In February 2024 the Board of Regents of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor
7 (CUWAA), President Erik Ankerberg, and the administration of both campuses were confronted with
8 financial realities that included a growing financial deficit; and

9
10 WHEREAS, The Ann Arbor campus had been unable to generate auxiliary revenue sufficient to meet its
11 needs leading to an annual average operational shortfall of \$4 million for the entire university; and

12
13 WHEREAS, We recognize that CUWAA is a Lutheran higher education community of The Lutheran
14 Church—Missouri Synod serving a focused educational mission in the world accountable for responsible
15 stewardship; and

16
17 WHEREAS, Christians may disagree over how to handle challenging situations which may be concerning
18 and painful for many to hear, especially students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, and other CUAA and
19 CUW stakeholders and the Ann Arbor community; and

20
21 WHEREAS, The Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA have
22 demonstrated resolve and intentional strategic thought as they considered a variety of initiatives
23 designed to better position CUWAA for the future; and

24
25 WHEREAS, The Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA have
26 demonstrated faithful Christian leadership in their service to the students, faculty, staff, and Synod in a
27 fair, reasonable, and responsible manner recognizing that as sinful, fallible mortals their communication
28 efforts could have been handled better; therefore be it

29
30 *Resolved*, That the Board of Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA be
31 commended for making the necessary decisions to ensure that CUWAA is financially secure and
32 sustainable for future generations; and be it further

33
34 *Resolved*, That by our prayers they would be encouraged in their responsibility to be "steadfast,
35 immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain"
36 (1 Corinthians 15:58 ESV); and be it further

37
38 *Resolved*, That the English District continue to pray in good faith for the ongoing efforts of the Board of
39 Regents, President Ankerberg, and the administration of CUWAA; and be it further

40
41 *Resolved*, That the English District continue to pray for the students, faculty, staff, alumni, donors, and
42 other stakeholders of Concordia Ann Arbor as these initiatives have and continue to have impact on the
43 Ann Arbor campus; and be it finally

44
45 *Resolved*, That since CUWAA directly impacts our churches, schools, and ministries and in the spirit of
46 fraternal support and encouragement; the English District receive a report at its next Convention
47 regarding the outcomes, benefits, and the ongoing efforts of the Board of Regents, President Ankerberg,
48 and the entire administration of CUWAA.

Rev. Dr. Chad Kendall serves as the Associate Vice President for Church Relations and Mission and Associate Professor of Theology at Concordia University Chicago.
